Twenty20 **Success** for Valleys

THE power hitting of Amit Chaudhary came to the fore as Moonee Valley exacted revenge over Taylors Lakes to win the North West Cricket Association Twenty20 grand final.

"Amit had borrowed skipper Mark Gauci's Fisher bat and hit the ball so hard that it didn't just leave white chemies on the blade, but chunks of white paint broke off the ball and embedded in the willow's surface.

The Valleys defended the total to perfection. First XI star allrounder Arosha Perera claimed

Walker was equally impressed with Gauci. "He set his outriders about a third of the way in from restricting most of the the fence, restricting most of the Taylors Lakes shots to singles and leaving his boys in the perfect position to take the catches when the batsmen tried to hit out." At long last, the Moonee Valley Black team has registered its first win after more than 21/2 years in the women's one-day north-west section.
